Celebrating 125 years of community service, OCC was joined by distinguished speakers and guests: Assemblywoman Sandy Galef, Westchester County Executive George Latimer, Ossining Mayor Victoria Gearity and Ossining Town Supervisor Dana Levenberg.

co-chair Rebecca "Becky" Samberg and her late husband Arthur Samberg donated the property and the generous seed funding that made the project possible. "Art and I have always felt strongly that every child should be able to have the kinds of experiences that our children and grand-children have had," said Mrs. Samberg. "This building will make those opportunities available to more children from our community."

The new Center can accommodate up to 220 children in large state-of-the art classrooms, indoor gym, and multiple outdoor recreation areas that provide ample space for children to learn, grow and play while staying healthy and safe.

While the fundraising campaign for the building has been very well-supported, the final funds are yet to be raised.

Child Care is an Essential Service by Executive Director Howard Milbert

During this time of intense political polarization, a consensus seems to be emerging that government funding for child care is a needed investment in our economy. Without good, affordable child care, low- and moderate-income employees can't go to work, and small businesses can't function.

The COVID-19 pandemic has brought child care, and the lack thereof, into focus. Numerous news articles in national, regional and local media have reported on the demise of child care centers that have succumbed to Covid-induced financial pressures. These pressures include closures, under-enrollment, and the cost of extra staffing, equipment and supplies needed to prevent spread.

The Wall Street Journal reported that "Coronavirus Threatens to Push the Child Care Industry Over the Edge," in its October 17, 2020 edition. The article quotes University of Minnesota Economist Elizabeth Davis: "If the virus magically disappeared, could we go back to where we were in January? We couldn't if there's no child care."

The business community has realized that good, reliable child care is an essential service for a functioning economy. And it has become patently clear that most child care centers run on a financial razor's edge. Another few months without an infusion of government support means more child care centers will be closing their doors.

I want to express my deep thanks to you – our donors and volunteers – for your generous support of OCC's service to the community. But philanthropy, alone, is not enough to sustain high quality, affordable child care. Please join us in advocating for Federal government stimulus funding for child care. Child care is an essential service. It's a non-partisan issue.

In Memoriam: Ann Conklin Tributes from OCC parents, staff, and board. 1926-2020

Ann Conklin worked for OCC for more than 40 years. Most of us think of her as the receptionist and clerk, but she began as a kitchen assistant and then was an assistant teacher. Her longest held and most recent job was as our main office receptionist and clerk. But her most important role was "grandma" to everyone at the Center.

Some 25 years ago, a child called her "Annie-Pooh" because she was wearing a Winnie the Pooh sweatshirt. The nickname stuck.

The notice of her passing on the OCC Facebook page inspired more comments than any other post. Here are a few:

We loved and adored Annie Pooh! She was like a grandmother to Evan, Colin, and Peter, whose grandparents lived far away. She would give them hugs and little treasures that she had tucked away in her drawer. We are all so lucky to have known such a sweet and wonderful person. Ann was the first one in in the morning and her cheerfulness set the tone for the rest of the day. The Children's Center will not be the same without her. – Howard Milbert

We Stand on the Shoulders of Giants

Moving into 32 State Street was exciting, as teachers and staff set up their new classrooms to welcome our children. But some were teary eyed as we said goodbye to 90-92 S. Highland Avenue, our home for several decades.

The buildings evoke memories of two giants in OCC history: Joan Hovdesven and Terry Crandall, long-time board members who gave time, talent and treasure to support the Center.

In the 1960s and 70s, Joan, an antiques dealer, managed the

OCĈ thrift shop as a volunteer. The shop subsidized the Center's operating budget. Her daughter Susan remembers helping sort clothes and jewelry, and, Susan says, "Learning the importance of giving back to the community."

In 1995, Terry Crandall helped lead the capital campaign to purchase and renovate 92 South Highland Avenue. For her leadership and her personal generosity, OCC named the Infant and Toddler Center in her honor. Later, Terry's family established a scholarship in her name to subsidize child care for single parents in college or in a job training program.

Joan's daughter Susan also played a leadership role in that 1995 campaign. Susan reached out to family and friends and raised significant funds to honor Joan's memory. OCC named 90 South Highland Avenue for Joan Hovdesven.

OCC's new State Street home, and its rooms and play areas, bear the names of a new generation of leaders.

Art was a visionary. He wanted to help us create the center we always dreamed of having. He wanted to do this for Ossining, the town in which he lived, he wanted to do this for Becky, and

Helping Others Brings Happiness

Before Fernando Decampo became one of OCC's most hardworking and effective volunteers during the pandemic, he was dropping off his three young children at OCC on his way to work.

"I felt like OCC made my children part of their family," he says. "The staff were amazing and I knew the kids were in a safe place. My children learned so much and I never had to worry about anything," he continued. "All of my children attended from two years old through elementary school and OCC was there for them every step of the way."

As his children grew older, Fernando, like many OCC parents, came to rely on OCC to help navigate public school. Some OCC families are overcoming language barriers, and parents work long hours. Fernando appreciated that OCC helped the children to complete their homework when he came to pick them up at the end of a long day.

When the pandemic struck Fernando found himself out of work for two months. During this time he connected with Stacey Winnick and the two soon realized the extent of the struggles many OCC families were facing. Over the next several months Fernando put hundreds of miles on his car delivering groceries, often to ten families in one day.

When the heat became oppressive over the summer he drove to Albany to pick up an air conditioner for a very grateful family, "You never know what tomorrow will bring," says Fernando, "I believe what you get with one hand you should give with the other. Someone has always been there to help me and my family when we needed it most. It makes me so happy to be able to help others."
